

Καὶ σὺ, τέκνον!
Tu quoque, fili mi!

doubtlessly have a severe
CONFIRMATION BIAS!

Gaius Julius Caesar presumably spoke his famous last words — upon spying Brutus among his assailants — in an *admonishing* tone rather than a *questioning* one & (if at all) most probably in Greek, which had a proverb: *καὶ σὺ, τέκνον, τῆς ἀρχῆς ἡμῶν παρατρώξη* (*kai su, teknon, tes arkhes hemon paratrokse*) = *You too, my child, shall have a taste of power*. Possibly, *Et tu, Brute?* (easier to understand by "normal" people) poetically turned it (already before Shakespeare) into a question out of surprise. Actually, J.C.'s true last words were: *brrwwwghgh fvrrrgrgwwhhh...*
